boardwalk time, evening programs, talent shows, family group, bunk time, daily ice-cream and so, so much more."





# NEW DINING HALL AND AMPHITHEATER PLEDGES ANNOUNCED!

Two pledges have been received that will underwrite construction of the new dining hall and the new amphitheater at Pilgrim Lodge.

The Quitobaquito Foundation has increased its original pledge to ensure the building of the dining hall, which is expected to seat 200, contain an up-to-code kitchen, and be usable three seasons a year. Ground breaking is planned for the fall of 2015. The new building will be called the Quitobaquito Dining Hall.

Chris and Josh Gagliardi (see an interview on page 1) have committed funds to ensure the building of the new amphitheater, an open, natural meeting place set into the hillside across from the current Lodge. The amphitheater will hold camp meetings, talent shows and other all camp events. The amphitheater will be called the "Circle of Friends" Amphitheater.

this year and wanted to help the campaign reach its goals. "Quite simply quite simply, it was never a question that we would support this campaign" says Chris. They were contributing a little each year to the year-end annual drives, but the idea of the amphitheater donation really struck a chord with them. "After looking through the Sustainability Report, we loved the idea of the amphitheater for so many reasons. Initially, it caught our eye, because our family is so invested in a local community musical theater program here in Central Florida. But after learning more about what the plans are for its use, we love the idea of adding this additional outdoor space that will be large enough for the entire camp to gather and be accessible to all who visit PL."

With the gift for the amphitheater come the naming rights, and as Josh tells, the answer was in the music. "We have the album of live PL songs, and when we were thinking about the songs that were meaningful to us, *Circle of Friends* really encapsulates what the space is for." Chris admits that "to this day I still get emotional anytime I walk into the Lodge to pick up our daughters from their weeks at camp and hear any of my favorite

songs being sung. It doesn't matter what song it is...Pharaoh, Pharaoh makes me cry just as much as Those Who Wait Upon the Lord -- it all just takes me back to my time there."

For Josh, although he wasn't a camper at PL, he understands when Chris and the girls talk about how much it means to them. "We have to make sure that PL survives to be as valuable a part of the Maine religious community as it has been. The Campaign can help make sure it's going to be around in the future and stay the amazing place it is."

"Our girls are the third generation in our family to attend PL. My mom was part of a group when she was in high school that spent a week on Manitou clearing the trails that are still in use today," Chris recounts. "We are hopeful that the *Circle of Friends* Amphitheater will exist for generations to come as a place to sit together and 'be at home, be at peace, be at rest'." Well said, Gagliardi family. We have no doubt it will.

### **BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT**

The Pilgrim Lodge Building Committee members have been working since September 2013 after being formed by the Pilgrim Lodge Task Force and confirmed by the Coordinating Council.

Our first task was to get a clear understanding of our responsibility and charge. Bryan Breault, Executive Director of Pilgrim Lodge, gave us a review of all the reports and proceedings leading up to and including the Fred Lilly concept design that was on display for the Blessing Event held September 15, 2013. At the Blessing Event those who attended were able to see the new boardwalk, accessible path to the Labyrinth and chapel. Brad Craig and Mark Schussler met with Fred Lilly and reported the following tasks for the committee:

- 1. Construct a new building that replicates the exterior and interior appearance of the existing buildings and has a capacity for a kitchen dining space for serving 200 people family style;
- 2. Provide and extension of the comfortable, welcoming, familiar and safe feeling of the existing camp;
- 3. Construct a new amphitheater that will serve as a weekly conference greeting venue and a space for general socializing, community building, etc. and preserve the chapel for "sacred space",
- 4. Create a "town common" atmosphere for the area between the Lodge, office, amphitheater, new building and the lake, (excluding car/truck traffic by creating a new road behind the office and new dining/kitchen building). This includes improvements for ADA accessibility throughout the area/buildings and visibility of the lake.

At our next meeting, we approved replacing the roof of the main lodge due to leakage. The new roof was completed in early December. We received also a capital project "tiers worksheet" to help the committee make timely decisions. In early March we approved new mattresses for all campers and counselors.

Most of our meeting times have been spent on getting information on the new building; for example, design, location and what will be included within the building. In Early April 2014 we are going to Pilgrim Lodge to do some site testing of the area where we hope the new building will be going to ensure that it will fit. We will be doing some additional site work for the roadway and the waterfront. Building committee members include Steve Hatt, Steve Wight, Steve Jones, Mark Patterson, Pam Burnham, Evelyn Clowes, Brad Craig, and Herb Oliver. Bryan Breault and Rick Cowles are advisors to the committee. We thank all of you who have made a 5 year pledge to make this campaign move ahead. All of us want to "Pass it On" to our next generation.


## CAMPER CREATES NEW NATURE TRAIL

Ben DiSalvatore has been a camper at Pilgrim Lodge from the time he was in 3rd grade and hasn't missed a summer in 11 years. So when it was time to choose an Eagle Scout service project to achieve the highest rank in his Boy Scout troop, PL was a natural choice. "I wouldn't be the person I am today without my time at Pilgrim Lodge so this seemed like a perfect fit" said Ben.

In dialogue with Rev. Bryan S. Breault, the Director of Outdoor Ministries, it was decided to create a new nature trail that would allow campers access to parts of the property that they were previously unable to enjoy.

Ben and his father Chris researched methods for creating walkways that would not negatively impact the wetland while Bryan worked on local permitting. Ben, with help from his family and members of his troop came to Pilgrim Lodge and cleared the trails. Meanwhile at his home in Bangor, construction began on a series of 11 twelve-foot frames used to lay across a series of "permafloats." In June, Ben and his troop and family placed the permafloats, laid the framework across them, and screwed down cedar decking on top. Next they chained the frames to the floats. The entire structure rises and falls with the water flow and does not inhibit the wetland at all.



The trail starts behind the shop at same point as most of the other PL trails. It

runs parallel to the camp road and then crosses the long-term parking road. Next, it traverses behind the ball field and deeper into the woods where it comes to the edge of the former Beaver Pond at which point the floating structure brings the traveler across the wetland to an old logging trail. That trail crosses a stream (across which Ben built a smaller bridge) and ends near the Farmhouse. One day, PL hopes to continue this trail on the other side of the property until it meets with the existing "Red Trail", allowing a hiker to access the entire camp.

Rev. Breault views the new trail as the fulfillment of a dream resulting in campers having access to several different natural environments for educational purposes and allowing them to utilize the entire property. Breault said "We are all very pleased and deeply grateful to Ben, his family and his Boy Scout troop for their dedication and hard work to make this dream a reality. Thank you Ben, and congratulations on your pending Eagle Scout status!"
